# Important information regarding Avian flu

Because of a new outbreak of Avian Flu earlier this year, chief medical officers have decided to enforce strict measures for birdkeepers. An Avian Influenza Prevention Zone (AIPZ) came into force across Great Britain on the 3 November 2021, and in Northern Ireland on the 17 November 2021. This was extended to include housing measures across the UK on the 29 November 2021.

These measures mean that it is a legal requirement for all bird keepers across the UK (whether they have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) to keep their birds indoors and follow strict biosecurity measures to limit the spread of and eradicate the disease.

The AIPZ in England means that bird keepers must:

- house or net all poultry and captive birds to keep them separate from wild birds
- cleanse and disinfect clothing, footwear, equipment and vehicles before and after contact with poultry and captive birds – if practical, use disposable protective clothing
- reduce the movement of people, vehicles or equipment to and from areas where poultry and captive birds are kept, to minimise contamination from manure, slurry and other products, and use effective vermin control
- thoroughly cleanse and disinfect housing on a continuous basis
- keep fresh disinfectant at the right concentration at all farm and poultry housing entry and exit points
- minimise direct and indirect contact between poultry and captive birds and wild birds, including making sure all feed and water is not accessible to wild birds

## Westhall's Fallen: The Second World War

Last month we looked at Westhall's contribution to the First World War – a conflict which saw the sleepy village lose six inhabitants to combat.

Although many more served in the Second World War – Army, Navy, Air Force, Home Guard, etc. – Westhall only suffered a single casualty to enemy combat, so I thought this section be dedicated to that man.

William Clarke was born in January 1912, and was a member of the Royal Navy Reserve when war broke out. He was assigned to the armed trawler, H.M Mastiff, which was then rebuilt as a minesweeper. On November 20th 1939, Mastiff struck a mine in the Thames Estuary whilst on patrol. William was one of six men who were killed instantly. His body was never recovered, and his name is recorded on Lowestoft's Naval Memorial.
