The Racehorse has been successful in our application for a grant of £96,600 to buy the pub! We were absolutely "gobsmacked" (in the words of Chris Punt!) when calls from Radio Suffolk and the East Anglian Daily Times told us the news had been announced in the Budget.

This will make a huge difference in securing the future of the pub as it means that we can now proceed with the purchase without a mortgage, enabling us to renovate the flat upstairs and develop the business without having the additional expense of the repayments. A real game changer for the Racehorse and cause to celebrate!

All our shareholders and subscribers can give themselves a big pat on the back as this has been a real team effort, an effort that at times required a great deal of patience! So, a massive thanks to you! Our focus will be now be on a speedy purchase and we have already started on the conveyancing.

We will keep you posted on our immediate plans once we have digested the good news.

#### Westhall's Fallen

On the subject of Remembrance Day, I thought it best that this section – normally reserved for a small segment on the history of our village – be dedicated to those from Westhall who made the ultimate sacrifice in the two World Wars:

Herbert James Sones was born in Halesworth on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> February 1897, and lived with his mother Minnie and father Thomas in *The Barracks*, Westhall. Before the war, he enlisted as a *Signal Boy* in the Royal Navy and was assigned to the HMS Pathfinder. Just over a year later, on the 5<sup>th</sup> September 1914, his ship was torpedoed by the German U-21 just outside the firth of Forth. It was the first ever ship to be sunk by a self-propelled torpedo. Out of nearly 300 men, only twenty were known to have survived. Herbert's body was never recovered, and his name is recorded on the Chatham Naval Memorial. He was seventeen years old.

George Bertie Goff was born in Strumpshaw, Norfolk, in April 1891, and lived at Hill House on School Road. He signed up as a volunteer in 1915, and served with the Bedfordshire Regiment, before being transferred to the Royal Welsh Fusiliers in mid-1916. On 24<sup>th</sup> March 1917, they were stationed on the Boesinghe Front, along the canal just north of Ypres, when an artillery strike wounded George severely. He was taken to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Canadian Casualty Clearing Station, where he sadly died two days later. His body is buried in the Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery.

George Henry Bloomfield was born in Westhall sometime in 1896, and lived with his widowed father, sister and their servant, in one of the Greyhound's rooms. He enlisted at Halesworth in 1915 as another of *Kitchener's Volunteers*, and served with the 92<sup>nd</sup> Brigade of the Royal Field Artillery. He was killed in action in the early hours of the 3<sup>rd</sup> June 1917, when his howitzer battery was fired on in retaliation for its attack on a German Army working party around the French town of Vraulx-Vrancourt the previous night. His body now rests in the Queant Road Cemetery.

**Sidney Lawrence Baker** was born in Westhall in mid-1894, and was living in Wangford at the outbreak of the Great War. He enlisted at Shoreditch in Middlesex, and was assigned to the Bedfordshire Regiment, serving in various battles at Ypres and The Somme throughout the next few years. On the 28<sup>th</sup> June 1917, the battalion took over an area known as *English Wood* – on the outskirts of Ypres – from the exhausted 20<sup>th</sup> Battalion of the King's London Regiment at midnight. Baker was among those employed to fix an area of the trench damaged by a recent raid. He was struck in the neck by a sniper's bullet in the early hours of the morning. His body is buried in the Dickebusch New Military Cemetery Extension.

Ernest Smith was born in Westhall on 11<sup>th</sup> March 1886. At the outbreak of war, he enlisted in the Royal Navy, working his way to the rank of Leading Seaman aboard the HMS Vanguard. Shortly before midnight on the 9<sup>th</sup> July 1917, at Scapa Flow, *Vanguard* suffered a series of magazine explosions. She sank almost instantly, killing 843 of the 845 men aboard. Ernests body – like most of those killed – was never recovered, and the wreck was designated a war grave in 1984. His name is recorded on the Chatham Naval Memorial.

The five names and lives listed here make up a miniscule proportion of the lives lost during the Great War, but show a seemingly sleepy village's enormous contribution to the most destructive period in human history. Aside from these names, a further 40 men and women served. Next issue, we'll take a look at the Second World War, and how Westhall played a part.
